To Kill A Mockingbird

How it WORKS- Teacher:

- Materials:
 - a shoe, I went to Walmart and purchased the cheapest pair of shoes. I display the shoe on a bookshelf and the students throughout the year ask me about it...I just say “You will see!” It is in the back of their minds all year.
 - Images that will invoke negative remarks, yes we are pretty much setting them up to fail, but it is a lesson learned
- After reading TKAM, walk around with the shoe and explain the rules

How it works- Teacher Con't:

- Students are not allowed to talk unless they have the shoe! **This must be stressed!**
- Show the image
- Toss the shoe and ask “So, what do you think?”
Ask students questions about the picture.
- Students will say negative things about the people,
don’t say anything till you have the shoe back

How it works- The Lesson

- “*Put yourself in someone else’s shoes’,*
 - Explain where the homeless man came from -Have a **story in mind, give them a name:** John Matthews was in Vietnam, family was killed early on as a child, lost his older brother in war, girlfriend left him for another while he was in war... just gave up on life, doesn’t care...
 - Explain the “hooker”: Melissa Ray was in foster care where she was abused, ran away, became addicted to drugs, became a prostitute, had a child, etc.


How it works-Student:

- Students are to remain quiet unless they have the shoe which is a visual representation of the lesson they are about to learn.
 - When you first show the image, they will be tempted to blurt something out, stress they have to remain quiet!!
- **Follow the discussion.** I have had some classes who didn't care, bring the conversation back to the book. Most classes are stunned by the people's stories, asking me if their stories are true.
